Redditch in the Snow - The Winter of 1962/3 Presentation by Anthony Green

The winter of 1962–63, known as the Big Freeze of 1963, was one of the coldest winters on record in the United Kingdom. Temperatures plummeted and lakes and rivers began to freeze over. On 29 and 30 December 1962 a blizzard swept across England and Wales, snow continued to fall in February 1963, and we had to wait until 6 March for the first morning of the year without frost in Britain. Temperatures rose to 17 °C (62.6 °F) and the snow disappeared.

When the snow hit Redditch, I was 19, and like my brother Vince needed to get to Birmingham, which was impossible, so we set out to record the effect on Redditch at this time.

At the time we lived in Holloway Lane and so we began from there. Holloway is the long incline between Studley Road on the Arrow Valley plain and Ipsley Street on the town plateau. Many vehicles were stranded, and the view is looking up at the Kings Arms. On the left are the trees in the gardens of Holloway House, which was demolished a few years later. The next image is looking down Ipsley Street towards the Kings Arms. At the Kings Arms it split into Beoley Road to the left and Holloway Lane to the right. On the left is Washford Mills and to the right in Terry's Springs.

Continuing along Ipsley Street we arrive at Poole Place, which is the junction with Alcester Street. The third picture is of Alcester Street looking up towards St Stephens Church. The only building still existing on this view, apart from the church, is the Palace Theatre on the right.

The final picture on this page shows the view from the end of Evesham Street to the north. The Birmingham bus, the 147, is just setting off! The bus station was off Red Lion Street, and the bus depot was in Church Road, both of which were at the same level as the crossroads, so no problem. It then went down Birmingham Road (Prospect Hill) and continued along fairly level ground on through Alvechurch until it arrived at the Birmingham Plateau, a rise of about 500 feet, at Hopwood. It didn't make it! And the Redditch – Birmingham route did not operate that day.

Evesham Street was the principal shopping centre for the town and was full of small local shops which served the local community. This is a view looking up Evesham Street to wards the south. The building facing us at the top were the Co-op.

Unicorn Hill is one of the oldest roads in the town. It had two public houses at the time. At the bottom was the Railway Inn (Golden Cross) and at the top, on the opposite side, was the Unicorn Inn.

At the bottom of of Unicorn Hill was Oakley Road. On the left is the Rifleman public house, and on the left the entrance to the railway station.

The picture bottom right is Easemore Road. This view has changed very little over time but nearer to Church Green, everything has changed. We then went down Other Road, which, at this time, carried on right through to Ipsley Street.

We then went back home in Holloway Lane, collected my brother's Land Rover and drove down Studley Road and parked in Watery Lane (blow left).

We then walked down Water Lane, crossed the Arrow and went as far as Ipsley Church. This area, now extensively redeveloped, was almost empty countryside.

This is a small selection from the 26 I used in the presentation.

The presentation was much appreciated by the audience which included those who remember Redditch at the time and those who remembered the snow but didn't know Redditch at the time.

Redditch Timeline for 1945 – end of WW2

January

15 Redditch lends hand of sympathy to West Ham, London - 117 blankets, 27 beds, 19 camp beds, 10 bedsteads and many, many more

25 ATC help to RAF thanked - tribute to RAF 143 (Redditch) Squadron - casualties of battle against Luftwaffe are fewer than expected.

February

13 A Garden Village for Redditch - proposed estate for owner-occupiers by J.W Hughes - 100 houses.

14 Formation of St. John Ambulance Brigade Nursing Division - Headquarters at Littleworth House Unicorn Hill.

24 Post-war employment conference at Redditch - Sir John Wardlaw-Milne M.P says, 'Get Ready'. Meeting at Council House.

March

3 Redditch plans new savings campaign - a target set not in money but in people - 2,000 people not in a savings group.

Wounded soldiers entertained at Redditch - Barnsley Hall Emergency Hospital by members of Redditch British Legion.

30 Redditch War Savings - Over £3 million raised – £3,484,803 since outbreak of war, and gratifying proportion by small savings.

The actual results for Redditch for specific targets exceeded the initial estimates and were:

- War Weapons Week - £195,000
- Warship Week - £210,000
- Wings for Victory Week - £283,000
- Salute the Soldier Week - £251,000

Each of the targets set were surpassed by a good margin.

April

7 Gaumont British Junior Club opened at Gaumont Palace - more than 800 boys and girls 7-14 years old were present at opening.

14 Mr. and Mrs. G. Prescott who had been civilian POWs on German occupied Channel Islands have been repatriated to Redditch.

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Redditch Timeline for 1945 – end of WW2 page 2

May

- 8 V.E proclaimed - Redditch received the great news. Streamers and electric bulbs of illuminations in Church Green.
- 13 Thanksgiving services and celebrations for victory at Redditch at all churches in Redditch- Civic parade on thanksgiving Sunday.
Processing of a police and town band march to Headless Cross Methodist Church for service - every available seat occupied.
- 18 Ministry of Food advice centre at Redditch opened in Evesham Street, Redditch. Formally opened by Mr. J. H Taylor - RUDC chairman
- 19 Redditch Horse Show and Gymkhana - Redditch NFU - HDA Grounds - raised £20 for Red Cross.
- 27 ATC salute RAF at national thanksgiving parade - London-Corporal R. Taylor represents Redditch Squadron
- Throughout May there were VE celebrations - processions, street parties, fancy dress parades, etc - over all the town and area.

The Redditch Indicator reported...

The official announcement of the ending of hostilities in Europe was broadcast by Mr. Winston Churchill on Tuesday afternoon. Immediately afterwards the Prime Minister went to the House of Commons and told the news.

News that VE Day would be celebrated on Tuesday was received on Monday evening. The prospect of the war clouds rolling away and letting in the bright sunshine of peace evoked feelings of gratification and of enthusiasm. Soon the streets of Redditch, and roads in the vicinity were made gay with bunting. Thanks to the good work of the members of the Redditch Carnival Committee, streamers and electric bulbs of illuminations had been fixed in Church Green. The national flags gave a touch of colour and blended tastefully with the summer garb of the trees in the pretty town centre.



June

VE day celebrations continued throughout the town - everyone felt it was a period to rejoice after so many difficult years

- 9 Redditch Royal Observer Corps Post ended 5 ½ years of valuable wartime service following order to stand down by Air Ministry.

July

- 25 Civil Defence Force - farewell entertainment and dinner - Kingfisher restaurant., Redditch
- 25 Redditch honours Australian Senator George McLeay - brother of Miss McLeay who ran Redditch Community Club.
- 27 Holidays at Home - Garden party at South Crest - scene at children's sports - Included donkey rides for children.
- 30 Britannia Batteries Sports Ground - Children fete in connection with Holiday at Home.

August

- 14 VJ peace celebrations at Redditch - at Midnight it was announced - Joyous but calm - decorations at Church Green
- 18 Redditch Liberal Club party - for members children - 120 children taken on ride into country. Sports at County High School
- 24 Typical VJ festivities in Abbeydale- main feature was a large bonfire with the burning of a 'Tokyo-Joe' effigy.

September

- 8 Batchley Road - party of 72 children went on to Stratford-upon-Avon for VJ celebrations - enjoyable visit spent.
- 15 Climax of 'Day of Days' Victory Carnival. Redditch Victory Carnival - to help food funds for hospital and celebrate victory.
- Local tradesman exhibits won by Mr. H. Ralph - Bananas on wheels exhibit called 'things to come'
- Terry's and Nife won best manufacturing exhibits.
- Climax of week of festivity - concerts, dances and displays - decoration. Exhibits assembled and judged.
- Day of Days ended just before midnight - key of town handed back to Mr. J.H Taylor by Carnival Queen.

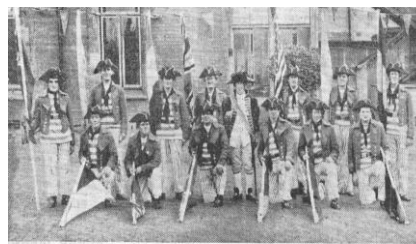
